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A Message from Your President

I should like to open this letter by saying how much I appreciate the honour of being elected your president. This took place at the 1974 a.g.m. while I was on a visit to Canada, leaving me in ignorance of your action for some months afterwards. However, I did attempt to express the surprise and pleasure which the news gave me to those attending the 1975 meeting.

I should also like to take this opportunity to say a very warm thank you to all who contributed so generously to my farewell presentation, especially those whom I was unable to thank personally at the a.g.m.

As most of you know I have spent the whole of my working life, apart from the war years, in Rendcomb. In many ways I feel that the major part of my education really began when I came here and has continued ever since. For this I owe an enormous debt of gratitude to our founder who made it possible and to the headmasters, staff and pupils who put up with my shortcomings and contributed so much in so many different ways to my understanding.

Rendcomb is now very different from the community which I joined in 1934. This was inevitable and is no cause for regret: no living institution can remain healthy in stagnation. I believe most O.R.'s will agree with me that the developments have been along the right lines to leave the college in a position where it can continue to make a really worthwhile contribution to our society. You must also be aware of the pressures being put on every form of independent education. What you may not all realise is what an important role can be played in the life and development of a school by a really strong association of former members. There are of course quite a number of us who already take a lively interest in college affairs but I feel that there is an opportunity for more to be done.

I am not quite sure what duties you expect of your president but what I should most like to see during my term of office is a great increase in the cooperation between the O.R. society and the college. Please put forward any ideas you may have on this subject.

The School And its Accommodation

It may be of interest to those old Rendcombians who have not visited Rendcomb for some time, to know what changes have been made to accommodate the increase in numbers in the school (now 240).

There are three boarding houses, apart from the main college building. The Old Rectory was converted into the Junior House (1st and 2nd forms) in 1966. The sixth form house (Park House) beyond the swimming pool, was opened in 1973 to accommodate 25 girls, and the boys of the second year sixth. A new house for the third year will come into operation this summer - this is in the area behind the old cottages (No.s 1 and 2), now

demolished. One of the flats in the Stable Block contains dormitories for some third years as well. In the main building, there are 27 study-bedrooms, built in 1963, over the old kitchen wing, and studies for 40 boys over the old 'Manual' area. In 1967, a new block was finished to accommodate the woodwork, art and music departments, together with some classrooms. This is on the back drive in the old 'Jungle' area. The headmaster's house was built in 1962, thus allowing the accommodation of the flat to be available for classrooms, common rooms and dormitories. The spacious first-floor washroom was converted into a classroom two years ago, the baths being put in the washroom area. On the ground floor, the old history room is now a junior dining room; the staff common room has been in the nether regions of the college (the old wash-up) for ten years. The 'Small Classroom' is the secretary's office. 'Woolton' was abandoned as the housekeeper's office on Miss Babington's departure and became firstly a telephone room and then was converted into a ladies cloakroom. The name, however, is still vaguely used to refer to the telephone kiosk in the old indoor games cupboard. The 'Music Room' was added to the dining room twelve years ago, when 'Big School' became an assembly hall. The 'maids sitting room' and 'Still Room' form a language laboratory.

Obituary

L.C. Schiller

Members of the first generation of Old Rendcombians will be grieved to learn of the death of Lionel Schiller. He came to the college a few months after it opened in 1920, to teach mathematics, and left to become H.M. Inspector of Primary Schools. He was often to be seen at O.R. reunions.

We have also learnt with regret of the death of **B.J. Brooks** (1920 - 23), one of the original twelve pupils. He served for 37 years in the R.A.F., retiring in 1958 with the rank of squadron leader. In informing us of his death his wife writes: "Bernard was so proud of his school, and I have been with him many times to different things - the last being the big anniversary luncheon a few years ago".

Adrian Patrick (1963 - 70) wrote in August as follows from the Abu Dhabi Petroleum Company: "Having graduated with a 2:1 in mining engineering from the Royal School of Mining, I joined B.P. as a petroleum engineer. On doing this, I was posted overseas to Abu Dhabi on secondment to ADPC. This is where I shall be for a year. Having gone through an initial unsettled period, being not quite sure whether I should have stayed in hard rock mining, etc., I now think I have chosen a materially and financially rewarding career. Basically I have been running around the desert, spending a large percentage of time on drilling rigs, carrying out the various duties of a rig petroleum engineer. Having stood 18 months here as a bachelor I couldn't stand any more, so last April I got married. My wife, whom I met at college, is a junior teacher and has a job at the local English school. At present she is still getting used to Abu Dhabi (and me probably!), but seems to be reasonably settled. Being mid-summer at present (120°F some days) she longs for U.K. and its rain. I now spend most of my time in the office on the design, development and planning stages of drilling and production. Later this year I shall go into reservoir engineering, thus giving me good all round experience. **Trevor** (1963 - 70) has also just gone into the oilfield business. He is with Santa Fe (U.K.) working as an electronics technician on a rig supply barge in the North Sea, but I doubt if it's long term, He works four weeks offshore, twelve hour shifts, and gets one week off. However, he is paid a very handsome salary!

The first lecture, given by Raymond Williams of Cambridge last November, was attended by many of G.'s friends and former pupils. Ruskin are opening a fund to finance the expenses of the lectures and some of G.'s friends may care to contribute to this.

N. Walter (1945 - 52) attacked the phenomenal performances of Yuri Geller with convincing acrimony in a letter read on Radio 4 recently, writing as a member of the Rationalist Society.

Bruce Mann (1967 - 74) wrote enthusiastically of his first term at Sheffield University. He says: "So far, I have covered very little new in the way of theory, although a lot of what I have done has given me a better understanding of the fundamentals. Practical work is completely different. I have joined the Officer Training Corps which gives me varied and exciting exercises on Wednesday afternoons and some weekends. I hope to take part in the High Peak Marathon in 10 days time".

Sarah Oughton (1973 - 75) is at the London Polytechnic. She finds London hectic and misses the country.

Reports from two other old Rendcombian climbers are worth recounting:-

Last Easter **Antony Pitt** (1967 - 73) came across a large school party which was totally unequipped for the icy conditions that were prevailing on the Glyder tops in Snowdonia. A boy had slipped down a snow slope and, though unhurt, was stuck in a dangerously exposed position, unable to be reached safely by the leaders of his party. Antony, correctly equipped, was able to retrieve the boy and shepherd the party safely over the remaining summit and down to easier ground.

In January, **David Bell** (1967 - 74) walking alone in the Lake District in bad weather, found a boy with exposure, whose companions were trying to keep him walking - exactly the wrong procedure in the circumstances. David made them help him to carry the boy to the nearest shelter, and then himself ran down the mountainside to alert the Ambleside mountain rescue team.

In both instances, their prompt, decisive, and correct action certainly prevented a more serious situation from developing, and quite probably saved life.
