One observation is that Rendcomb slang (so confusing for a newcomer to the staff) has virtually disappeared. However the "wagger" and the "dap" continue to hold their own. First-formers are "first-formers" these days and that unique oddity the "m'lever" is now consigned to the archives "Jackson!" now has no meaning, of course.

On the whole, too, nicknames have been replaced by the use of Christian names, usually in an abbreviated, monosyllabic form, and prefixed by "Hey!".

There have been a few enquiries about the clothing requirements. The old grey tweed lumber-jackets and shorts became defunct about twelve years ago, together with those monstrous grey suits - trouser linings too have disappeared. By a gradual process the school was transformed from a uniform grey to pastel coloured shirts, dark grey trousers and coloured pullovers for the fifth form and above. All boys above the third form have a sports jacket, which must be worn with a school tie, except for outings. There is a general requirement for all boys to have a dark grey suit, worn for church and theatre outings. The Junior House still wear shorts, grey shirts and grey pullovers. Thus some flexibility is provided within a modest range of uniform requirements. The girls tend to wear dark trousers and blouses as their basic uniform, with more variety of colour for outings, entertainments etc.

Nigel Meakin (1956 - 63) is a film cameraman with the B.B.C.

**Isabel Bartlett** (1973 - 75) spent four months at St.Christopher's Hospice, Sydenham, and then the summer months 'au pair' in Italy before beginning at the Charing Cross Hospital.

**Frank Ashe-Jones** (1925 - 29) writes to say that he is now completely retired and chained to his garden, but breaking out at times to the local golf course. His son **Martin** (1957 - 64) is in Australia at the dept. of English, National University, Canberra.

**Stuart Shellswell** (1958 - 66) has been at Applied Research of Cambridge since 1972 and spends his time designing and implementing computer systems, mainly in the fields of computer aided design of hospitals. "I taught classics and English, and practised cabinet-making under Oliver Morel, at Rendcomb from 1934, joining in the same term as Jack Fell and a little after John James - till I was called up in the summer of 1939, being in the Supplementary Reserve. After the war I came to King's, Canterbury, and taught there until 1969, being a housemaster for some years and commanding the cadets (CCF) for a long time. When I gave up

teaching in 1969 I took to computer programming, which I did for a year in London, and then for three years till 1973 at Kimberly-Clark, who make Kleenex near Maidstone. Since 1973, I have been IBM typesetting, first with a small firm of printers and then, when they folded up, on my own as a freelance, I find it highly interesting and skilful enough to be a challenge. After the war, I continued the practice of cabinet-making which Oliver Morel taught me so effectively, and made my own dining-room table and chairs and a lot of other things. I keep bees, and honey and beeswax furniture cream are very popular lines among my friends! Among my former colleagues at King's were Roger Medill (headmaster at Rendcomb 1971-), and John Holt, senior English master at Rendcomb (1968-). I married during the war, and my family, a boy and two girls are now all married."

**Nicholas Dalton** (1931 - 35) is now community dental officer in charge of a clinic in High Wycombe which covers some 5,000 children of all ages.

P. M. Tuft (1932 - 40) is a senior lecturer, dept. of zoology, Edinburgh University.

**Michael Bryant** (1953 - 60) reports that last summer he met **Bill Griffiths** (1960 - 67) who is teaching English in West Germany.

**Christopher Jones** (1966 - 73) has started work in the personnel department of the head office of Granada T.V.Rentals.

**Derek Wiggall** (1966 - 74) was married last June and still lives in Cheltenham. He has passed his year's course on the National Examinations Board in supervisory studies and is assistant manager in the fabric department at Cavendish House.

**Fraser Glennie** (1959 - 67) is with Hobbs and Chambers, chartered surveyors and estate agents of Faringdon (not Fairford - apologies, ed.), Cirencester and Swindon. He is also captain of Oxford City Hockey Club's 1st XI this season.

#### **P. H. Wyon** (1926 - 30) wrote last summer:-

"I retired from general practice in Thirsk, having been there since 1939 (except for 6 war years including four in India and Burma). I believe I was the first O.R. to qualify in medicine (1936).

I know that Gleeson-White is older but he did another degree before starting medicine! I remember 'Jimmy' Simpson well and once stayed with him and the family in Chelsea. Also Denis Browne - I came to the school before he did. I only came back once and had a good talk with Mr. James. It was a hot day and he wore only shorts and sandals! It is a pity it is such a long way from Yorkshire - the two counties have a lot in common - stone walls and plenty of hills."

**T. Stroud** (1968 - 75) has started work with the Dept. of Health and Social Security in Swindon as an executive officer.

#### Raymond Butler (1922 - 27) wrote in June:-

"I was very sorry to read that B. J. Brooks has died. He was a 'big boy' when I arrived at the college in 1922. He was known as 'Beaver' Brooks for some reason!"

**Jon Scawin** (1968 - 75) went to the University of Nottingham school of agriculture in October 1975. He says he surprised himself - and almost everyone else! - by passing B.Sc. Part I fairly comfortably. He has gone on to do animal science, probably involving mammalian physiology, animal production and animal management. He writes:-

"Sutton Bonington is a very interesting place. It is the faculty of agricultural science rather than an agricultural college and here one takes subjects only remotely connected with agriculture such as applied biochemistry. There are about 300 undergraduates and a very variable number of post-graduates. There is a wide range of sports, including squash, rifle and clay pigeon shooting - and some more outlandish ones such as hunting gnomes in Snowdonia - apparently very common in Welsh public bars!"

#### J. C. Beck (1939 - 44) wrote last July:-

"I retired from the army in 1965 to join the Ministry of Defence as a technical advisor. In January I was awarded the O.B.E. in the civil division - an odd circumstance for a retired regular soldier - and in February I was seconded to the diplomatic service for two years as a first secretary in our Moscow embassy. So far I can vouch for the rigours of a Moscow winter, but the summer has hardly been true to form. Normally we expect

three months of weather in the upper 80's. Instead we have had over 12 ins, of rain - the most since 1887 - and temperatures in the mid-50's to boot."

**Philip Faulks** (1970 - 76) has now moved to Australia. He has a place at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology, doing a course in art and design with complementary studies in English literature.

**Nige1 Raymont** (1971 - 75) enjoyed his first year at Solihull Sixth Form (not Solihull Technical - apologies ed.) College where be is doing 'A' level courses in English, history and Latin.

**Charles Hussey** (1974 - 76) is working for the Missions to Seamen in Rotterdam. He has sent a long and very interesting account of his life there; probably being the first O.R. for a long time to do this:-

"My day begins between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. depending on when I surface to the world. I then go off ship-visiting, which can last until about 2 p.m. depending on how many ships are on my 'patch'. We don't bother with Scandinavian and German vessels as they have their own missions. Normally I steer clear of E. European ships - and also French and Dutch ones. On average I stay on board one ship about half an hour, sometimes I am given a meal on board or invited to the bar. From some ships I sometimes get 'gifts' - food, squash (which is like gold-dust here), flags etc. It is, I suppose, their way of saying 'thank you'....

.... In the afternoon, I have time to myself in which I may go shopping, sleep, read, prepare my evening meal. From 6 p.m. I go and help in the bar - I either serve behind the counter or am about to chat to seamen, play snooker or table-tennis. Most nights I have to collect seamen from their ships in our minibus (which actually works well, unlike the school's!) and take them back when we close, in various conditions.

**Simon Beckett** (1970 - 76) is enjoying his course at the High Wycombe College of Technology, School of Furniture and Design.

Dick Field (1924 - 31) has retired and is a freelance consultant, lecturer, writer and examiner in art education.

**Gerald Page** (1950 - 55), married with two small sons, is intending to move to Southsea this year as he left Fox and Sons, Estate Agents, some three years ago and is now a valuer with the estates department of Portsmouth City Council. His brother Derek is working with a firm at Thrupp, near Stroud, as an electrical sales engineer. He is married with a daughter aged 10.

**Tessa Wolferstan** (1974 - 76) is playing for the Cambridge University 2nd netball team. In the summer she hopes to go overland to India.

**Stephen Bushell** (1967 - 74) is with British Rail (civil engineering division).

First generation members of the college may be interested to know that an article on **Mr. J. H. Simpson** (headmaster from 1920 - 32) is to appear in a standard encyclopaedia produced under the auspices of the University of Ghent. The author of the article is a Mr. F. Simon of Brussels.

**Graham Bodman** (1936 - 43) recently visited the college. He is now deputy head of mechanical engineering design for the South African Bureau of Standards.

Peter Binks (1935 - 41) and his wife were in Rendcomb early in the year. They are still living in Australia.

**Bryan Ferguson** (1960 - 64) is also working in Australia. He is a sales manager for a company marketing an industrial centralised vacuum system.

**C. J. M. Murry** has completed his sequel to *One Hand Clapping* which contains further reminiscences of his years at Rendcomb.

**Mr. Richard Winter**, who was the headmaster's secretary from 1938 - 40, is now a divisional education officer for Buckinghamshire.

**K. Shepheard** (1944 - 47) was responsible as producer for the BBC 2 Chronicle programme *The Lion and the Fox*, shown on February 15th. His programme on *Gibbon* was shown again recently and has now reached the final in the British Academy of Film and Television contest for the best films of the year.

**Gerard Benson** (1944 - 50) recently revived his memories of Rendcomb by a brief visit. He is a part-time lecturer at the Central School of Speech and Drama.

**John Gooding** (1951 - 59), now a lecturer in history at Edinburgh University, wrote of his interest on finding that one of his new intake of students came from Rendcomb, and his agreeable surprise on discovering that this student was a girl - **Jane Lyons** (1974 - 76) in fact!

**Clarence Tuck** (1935 - 43) has been made director of the civil service selection board. He has been in the civil service for 27 years, including a two year period in Nigeria. With the new appointment he becomes a civil service commissioner.

**John Kitto** (1944 - 51), who has been a member of the Scottish Symphony Orchestra for some years has now become a peripatetic music master with the Leicestershire Education Authority.

**Peter Ryman** (1943 - 51) was chief development engineer on the Pegasus engine for the Harrier aircraft. He is now chief engineer for the RB199 engine, a joint development by British (Rolls Royce Aero Engines), German and Italian companies for the Tornado multi-role combat aircraft. This is one of the biggest collaborative projects in Europe.

**Keith Stimson** (1955 - 63) is deputy managing director of McEvoy Oilfield Equipment Ltd., operating from Woodchester.

**Peter Cockell** (1943 - 52) is marketing and engineering manager, aerospace division, Ransome Hoffman Pollard Bearings Ltd., based at Stonehouse.
