Obituaries

We have learnt, with deep regret, of the deaths of the following:-

W. Smallwood (1924 - 29) Date unknown

Rev. J.P. Hart (rector of Rendcomb, 1959 - 67) 25th October 1979

J.R. Wheeler (1927 - 34) C.G.V. Taylor writes:-

"After a period of deteriorating health, Richard Wheeler died on September 21st 1879 at Ludlow, to which he had recently moved from Clun. He was cremated at Shrewsbury, I was present on this sad occasion".

Of **Christopher Sidgwick**, whose death was reported in the last issue of the newsletter, Tony Perkins (1924 - 31) writes:-

"I particularly wanted to say how sad I was to hear of the death of Christopher Sidgwick. He shared with me one of the major adventures of my youth - a cycle camping tour of Southern Ireland in 1931. It was quite tough in those days when even the main roads in the south west were untarred and electricity had not yet arrived. But we had a fortnight of adventure and good fellowship which we both recalled with pleasure. More recently we spoke by telephone and he told me something of the historical background of his exciting novel 'Manhunt in Dalmatia' We planned to meet but it didn't happen, and I lament the loss of a good friend, someone who somehow was a little larger than life."

Ernest James Miller M.C. A.R.I.B.A. (1926 - 31) His brother, Howard (1929 - 31) writes:-

"My Brother, Jim, died very suddenly on December 7th 1978 at his home in Esher. He had retired early in June of that year, from his position as an architect with the Greater London Council. He leaves a widow, but there were no children. We were pleased that one O.R., Joe Maslin (1925 - 31) was able to attend the funeral. On leaving Rendcomb in 1931, he spent 4 years as pupil and assistant to a well known local architect, Eric Cole in Cirencester. He left in 1935 to broaden his experience and became a technical assistant in the architects' department of the London County Council, working primarily on new hospitals. He returned to private practice in 1937 as assistant to a distinguished architect, P.D. Hepworth in Chiswick, and worked on plans for Walthamstow Civic Centre and Wilts County Hall at Trowbridge. War came and he was a member of the St. Paul's Cathedral watch for a year before joining the Royal Artillery in 1940. He was commissioned in 1943 and went on active service overseas in Burma, Malaya and Java, as a captain in 5th Indian Field Regt. R.I.A. He was awarded the M.C. in 1946. He rejoined Mr. Hepworth, who was principal architect to the War Graves Commission, and they collaborated on the plans for 60 cemeteries in France, Belgium. Holland and Germany. and three memorials to the missing at Bayeux, Groesbeak and Dunkirk. He became an A.R.I.B.A. in 1951. Rendcomb was a lifelong influence on my brother, and in London he was a regular visitor to the Chelsea home of J.H.Simpson (headmaster 1920 - 32). D.W.Lee-Browne (Headmaster 1932 - 60) asked him to design bookcases for the college library; these were made in Cirencester by C.H.Uzzell, father of Denis Uzzell (1926 - 34)."

Alison White (1976 - 78). Deborah Harrison (1976 - 78) writes:-

"Alison White and her mother, Margaret, died tragically in a car accident on January 14th 1980. Alison was 19 and studying history at Royal Holloway College. Her sudden and tragic death is a great shock to all who knew her. Alison was always a kind and gentle person, immensely understanding and true as a friend. She will be sorely missed, for she meant so much to so many people. She will be cherished in our hearts for the rest of our lives. On behalf of all Old Rendcombians, I should like to send our deepest sympathy to the White family."

It was a special tribute to Alison that so many of her contemporaries attended the funeral at North Cerney church, many having come considerable distances to do so.

Old Rendcombian News

Phillip Graham (1968 - 73) who is on the staff at Beaudesert School, Minchinhampton played in the county golf team in October.

Roger Brain (1937 - 45) is still with U.N.E.S.C.O. in Paris.

Antony Rose (1965 - 71) qualified as a doctor in 1977 and is now an anaesthetist in Liverpool.

B.R. Ferguson (1960 - 65) is married and permanently based in Australia. He says he is still playing some hockey and squash.

R.G.E. Hutton (1926 - 28) wrote to the secretary as follows last July:-

"When I left Rendcomb in December 1928 I jointed the Royal Air Force and remained in that service until May 1962. During that time I was in the aircraft engineering branch, and completed my last 10 years with the rank of warrant officer. In May 1962 I joined a local engineering firm engaged in the manufacture of machine tools. My position with them was production planner, and I finally retired in May this year."

Peter Sumsion (1942 - 49) retired as head of art at Eton College in July 1978, after 19 years there. He is now teaching as a full time teacher in the department of first year studies at the Glasgow School of Art. He has built a new house on the shore of Loch Fyne and would welcome contact with any of his contemporaries in the area,

A.E.Godsell (1933 - 38) is still farming near Tetbury.

Louis Webb (1957 - 66) is married with a two month old son (Tomos) He is in general practice as a vet.

John Goodborn (1954 - 62) writes to say that he has had a variety of occupations - carpenter, Max Jaffa orchestra, Royal Ballet orchestra, insurance agent, musical instrument repairer, reading maths at Aston

University (failed), and teacher of music. He has now settled to scraping(!) a living as a freelance double bass player. He still has the double bass he made at Rendcomb.

C.G.V. Taylor (1925 - 32) sent the following details last July:-

"While at Rendcomb I was secretary of the general meeting (with R.J. Butler as chairman) during the term when the founder died. I had the sad duty - rather a responsible one for a fourth former - of writing the letter of condolence on the meeting's behalf to Mrs. Wills. I am indebted to Mr. S.G. Shimmin for developing an interest particularly in Bach, which has deepened as the years have gone by. I was the first boy organist at Rendcomb and as such I used to play for alternate morning services; Miss L.M.C. Inge played for the others. I maintained contact with Mr. and Mrs. Shimmin until their deaths. I was also the first of Mr. James' pupils to win an open award, an exhibition at New College, Oxford. I should add in fairness that Mr. James himself gave much of the credit for this to his predecessor. Mr. E.G. Hessing. I taught history and some geography at Wycliffe College and its associated Junior School from 1937 to 1944. In 1939 on the outbreak of war, the school moved to its wartime quarters at Lampeter, Cardiganshire, as the Meteorological Office occupied the Stonehouse premises. In 1944 I became history master at Thetford Grammar School in Norfolk. This position I held for 101 terms until my retirement in March 1978. In later years the school became known (from one of its founders) as Thetford Fulmerston School and amalgamated with the Girls' Grammar School on the opposite side of the road. Dating possibly from the 7th century, it is one of the oldest schools in England. During all these years I used my home in Southrop for holiday periods and to it I have now retired."

David Henshaw (1940 - 49) has been chairperson of dance at the Middlesex Polytechnic and his main work has been in establishing the first B.A. performance arts course in Britain. He is at present on a year's study leave in Washington D.C. at the Department of Performing Arts, American University.

A.G. Ensor (1926 - 31) was ordained deacon and priest in 1939 (Gloucester diocese). Between 1939 and 1945, he held curacies at Winchcombe, Wooton-under-Edge and Westcote. From 1945 to 1952 he was in South Africa, returning to the diocese of Ipswich in 1953. Subsequently he was rector of Newton Green and Homersfield. He retired in 1976 and now lives in Woodbridge, Suffolk.

J. Archer (1938 - 45) wrote last July:-

"...it may be a little easier for my wife and I to get across to Gloucestershire now that our family is growing up. Our elder son and eldest daughter are now both married and our younger son and middle daughter are working away from home. Only one daughter remains at home. We became grandparents last December.

Simon Wormleighton (1968 – 75) is at the Institute of Higher Education in Weymouth, studying English as his main subject. He hopes to teach at the secondary age range when he qualifies. He says that **Mike Finlay**'s (1969 - 74) group played in Weymouth early last year.

A.G.B. Wallace (1949 - 55) who teaches in Ontario, is hoping to come to England on an exchange visit.

John Garvie (1971 - 76) graduated at Leeds last summer and has been teaching English at a language school in Italy at Ancona. His sister Elizabeth played a leading role in the recent television production of 'Pride and Prejudice'.

Hamish Wilson (1971 - 78) who is going to Sussex University in October spent some of last year in Paris:-"...we, that is various Rendcombians, rented a tiny 'Chambre de bonne' at the top of an office block in the rue de la Chaussee d'Antin. Situated in close proximity to 1'Opera, we were right in the centre of the Paris hive of activity. **Joe Watson** (1971 - 78) and I were extremely lucky to witness such a truly Parisian event as a demonstration: cars were burnt out, but the celebrated 'pave' remained just about intact. The riot police turned out in force armed with tear gas - the scene resembled a twentieth century version of a Victor Hugo creation. Later in the summer I returned to France, this time without Rendcombian companionship - then decided to go to Italy and Corfu. Beginning in Milan, travelling down to Genoa, crossing the border to Monaco, I followed the south coast as far as St. Tropez. From there I headed north through Provence and finished my holiday in Geneva".

His brother, **Alistair** (1969 - 76) is working at the museum in Stroud, and their sister Fiona has just joined the sixth form.

Richard Pearce (1965 - 71) is a senior medical laboratory scientific officer at Hereford hospital. He is to be married in July.

Nicholas Marlow (1973 - 78) is taking his 'A' levels at Cheltenham Technical College in June. He intends to make a career in banking, after visiting Australia this summer.

Christopher Beeby (1948 - 49) was New Zealand ambassador in Tehran until recent events lead to his hasty departure. There was a brief glimpse of him on BBC2.
