

"TIGER AT THE GATES"

This play was first performed in 1928 under the title "La Guerre de Troie n'aura pas Lieu". Like many of his generation, Jean Giraudoux was deeply shocked by the relentless inevitability of the events leading to the First World War, by the atmosphere which has been called "le consentement frémissant à la guerre" (shuddering consent to war). The fact that this holocaust could take place, apparently against the will of the rulers and peoples participating, seemed to him to argue the existence of an external force called Destiny.

Unlike many of his generation, Giraudoux foresaw the return of conflict in 1939. It was against the background of the Locarno Treaty of 1925, when a few far-sighted politicians were trying to avoid a return to mass-slaughter, that he wrote "La Guerre de Troie n'aura pas Lieu".

What results is a classical tragedy in modern form. We know that the Trojan War will take place, and that nothing will ever be the same afterwards. We are invited to examine how and why it happens. Destiny has its instrument in Helen, who is in the world but not of it. It also makes use of "the others" — those who do not have to fight. All Hector's efforts, even with Ulysses' help, are powerless against the catastrophe Fate has decreed.
